Mariane Bourcheix-Laporte

PhD Candidate, School of Communication, Simon Fraser University

Mariane Bourcheix-Laporte (she/her) is currently completing a PhD at SFU's School of Communication, with a focus on Canadian cultural policy and artist-run organizations. In 2019, she received the Canadian Communication Association's Doctoral CRTC Prize for Excellence in Policy Research for the paper "Creative Canada: A Critical Look at a 'New' Cultural Policy Framework." Mariane obtained an MFA in Interdisciplinary Arts from SFU's School for the Contemporary Arts in 2012 and has exhibited artistic and curatorial projects across Canada.

Description:

In her presentation, Mariane will draw from recent projects and collaborations to discuss policy issues and contexts relevant to the use of media in educational settings. The presentation will provide an overview of legislative changes resulting from the coming into force of the *Online Streaming Act* and how these may impact both independent media arts and academic communities.

Digital Media and Visual Resources Librarian, Concordia University Library

Hélène Brousseau is the Digital Media and Visual Resources Librarian at Concordia University, subject librarian for Cinema, Contemporary Dance and Music programs. From 2016 to 2022 she was the Digital Collections and Systems Librarian at Artexte. She serves on the board of Vtape a non-profit video art distribution organization in Canada. She is interested in issues related to open access in the arts, research-creation and participatory digital culture in Wikimedia projects.

Description :

Hélène will give a presentation about Concordia University Library's approach to acquiring and making available media collections and addressing their successes and ongoing challenges.

Victoria Sigurdson is a librarian empowering teaching, learning and research communities through the development of responsive academic library services and collections. She is a graduate of York University's Bachelor of Fine Arts (Visual Arts Studio) program and holds a master's degree in Library & Information Studies from Dalhousie University. In addition to an established history of collaborative projects with diverse stakeholders, her experience includes visual materials management, reference and research services, digitization activities, accessibility services, social learning spaces, as well as intellectual property and licensing consultation.

Victoria's presentation will address video accessibility including topics such as the benefits of captioning, media accessibility requirements for educational institutions, and common accessibility features in educational streaming media platforms.

Through her work as an arts administrator, Jennifer works as the Executive Director for the National Indigenous Media Arts Coalition, and works on projects that include programming, consulting and research for many arts organizations, mostly in the media art sector. For eleven years, she worked in Independent film and video distribution, and much of her work still crosses over with the work she did in distribution.
